Community

William G. Enloe High School is a Gifted & Talented International Baccalaureate Magnet High School in a Wake County residential community inside the Interstate 440 beltline. It is near the state government complex, banking and commercial facilities, and universities, and is 15 minutes from Research Triangle Park. Enloe, a 9th- through 12th-grade school, has an enrollment of 2,517 students. Its magnet program draws students from all over the county.

Curriculum

Enloe's program is divided into three main curricular areas: Humanities; Science and Mathematics; and Visual and Performing Arts. Students may choose to concentrate in at least one area of study where classes meet for two-period blocks of time. Areas of concentration include math, science, the humanities, dance, broadcasting, career and technical education, art, and health and physical education. The school offers more than 200 courses, many of which are not offered in other Wake County high schools. These include, but are not limited to, nine foreign languages, advanced computer science, audio and TV production, and extensive work in performing and visual arts. Enloe offers a Medical BioScience Academy and a Design and Merchandising Technologies Academy. Dozens of Honors, Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate courses are available.

Schedule

Enloe's schedule is a modified traditional seven-period day, with each class period lasting about 45 minutes for the entire school year. Most courses are offered in yearlong format; some, semesterlong. There are opportunities for students to take an eighth course during a lunch period for a maximum credit-earning potential of eight credits a year.

Enloe graduates are consistently admitted to some of the most highly selective colleges and universities in the United States. The Class of 2015 received in excess of \$15.4 million in grants and scholarships.

International Baccalaureate Programme

The International Baccalaureate Programme is a prestigious course of study of closely regulated areas leading to an IB diploma. The program integrates a student's work during 11th and 12th grades in six subject areas in a balanced humanities and science-mathematics program; 154 nations have schools offering diploma programs. Enloe applied for the IB programme and undertook a rigorous self-evaluation, as well as training at IB sites for teachers, and visits from an IB committee, to qualify for the programme.



Accreditation and Awards

- William G. Enloe High is accredited by the Southern Regional Association and the N.C. State Board of Education.
- In 2013, Enloe was named a "School of Distinction" by the N.C. Department of Public Instruction.
- In 2009, Enloe was ranked a "School of Excellence" by the Magnet Schools of America.



Graduation Requirements

Graduation from Enloe High School requires the successful completion of a minimum of 22 units of credit earned in grades 9-12. Students also have to meet established competency criteria, which may include the N.C. End-of-Course testing. Students must satisfy all the course and testing requirements within the Future Ready Core Course of Study.

Note about special courses

Magnet Civilizations and Culture 9 (C&C):

The 9th-grade Civilizations and Culture course meets requirements for 9th-grade required English and 9th-grade Civics & Economics. These are Honors-level courses.

Magnet Civilizations and Culture 10 (C&C):

The 10th-grade Civilizations and Culture course meets requirements for 10th-grade required English and 10th-grade World History. These are Honors-level courses; an option with AP World History is available.

Class rank

Class rank is based on final grades in all subjects and is computed at the end of each school year. Grade point averages are derived by dividing the total number of quality points by the number of credits attempted. AP and IB courses get two extra points; Honors courses get one extra point.

Grading system

The grade scale for this year's 12th-graders was a seven-point scale through 2014-15; beginning the 2015-16 year, a 10-point scale was instituted. The chart below lists the quality points offered in AP/IB, Honors (H) and Standard (S) courses.
